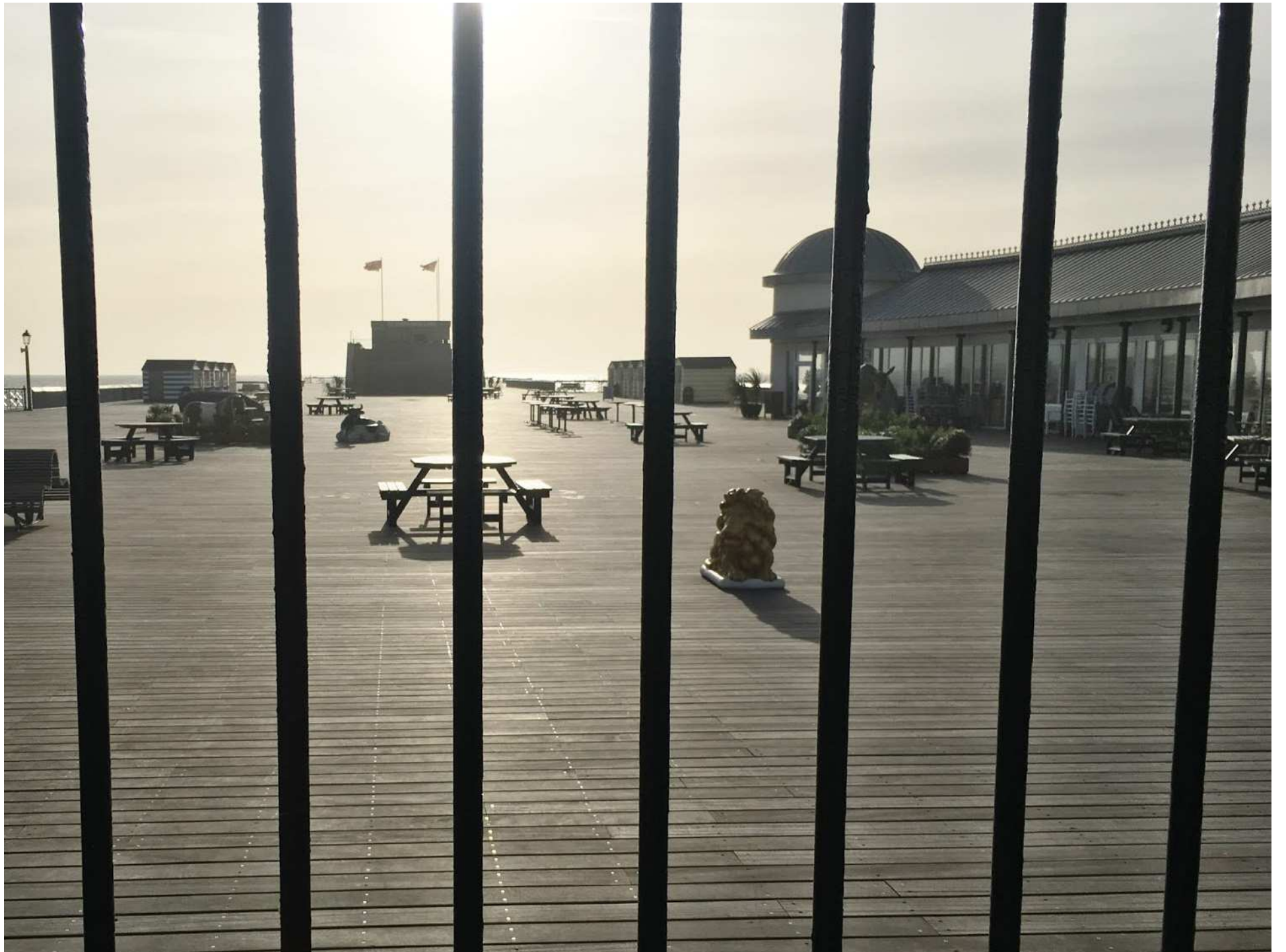

The Visitors

Professor Chris Whitty

Chris Whitty took over from Dame Sally Davies as the Chief Medical Officer in October. Before taking up this role he was Chief Scientific Adviser for the Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) with responsibility for the department's research and development, including the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) and life science strategy. He retains responsibility for the NIHR within his new role.

He is also Professor of Public and International Health at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine (LSHTM) and a practicing NHS Consultant Physician in acute medicine and infectious diseases at University College London Hospitals (UCLH). He is Gresham Professor of Physic.

He is an epidemiologist and physician. He has undertaken research in the UK, Africa and Asia. He has been chair or member of several government and international medical or scientific advisory committees.



Dame Professor Anne Johnson

Anne M. Johnson is Professor of Infectious Disease Epidemiology at University College London and Chair of the Population and Lifelong Health Domain in the Faculty of Population Health Sciences. After training in medicine at Cambridge and Newcastle Universities, she specialized in Epidemiology and Public Health.

She has worked in research in the epidemiology and prevention of HIV and sexually transmitted infections and other infectious diseases for over 30 years. She co-directed the Medical Research Council, UK Centre for Co-ordinating Epidemiological Studies of HIV and AIDS from 1985 until 1999 and was principal investigator on the 1990 first National Survey of Sexual Attitudes and Lifestyles.

She was founding co-Director of UCL's Institute for Global Health and was formerly Chair of the MRC Population Health Sciences Group. She was a member of the Adaptation Sub-committee of the UK Committee on Climate Change from 2011 to 2018. She is currently a member of the Board of Governors of the Wellcome Trust. She Chaired the Academy of Medical Sciences Health of the Public 2040 Working Group and is Vice President International elect of the Academy. She was awarded the Alwyn Smith Prize for contribution to Public Health in 2017. She was made Dame Commander of the British Empire in 2013 for contributions to the study of infectious disease.



Dr Louise Wood

Louise is Director of Science, Research & Evidence at the Department of Health and Social Care. Alongside the Department's Chief Scientific Advisor, she leads the National Institute for Health Research and has responsibility for policy research and science policy.

She has held several roles in the Department's R&D Directorate and prior to that worked in drug safety and post-authorisation regulation, was founding Director of the General Practice Research Database (now CPRD) and a member of the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency's Executive Board for four years.

She has also worked on secondment at the Association of Medical Research Charities as its Director of Policy and Public Affairs.



Jane Barrett

Jane works in the Science, Research and Evidence Division, part of the CSA Group in DHSC, and leads on commissioning programmes of multi-disciplinary research, analysis and evaluation to underpin the prevention agenda. As part of her role Jane is responsible for the NIHR School for Public Health Research, which is one of the mechanisms by which the NIHR supports local public health practitioners and policy makers to engage with research.

Jane also represents the NIHR on the multi-funder UK prevention Research Partnership - an exciting new initiative focused on improving population health, and reducing health inequalities, through the primary prevention of non-communicable diseases.

Jane is a social researcher by background and completed a PhD in socio-legal studies at the University of Plymouth.

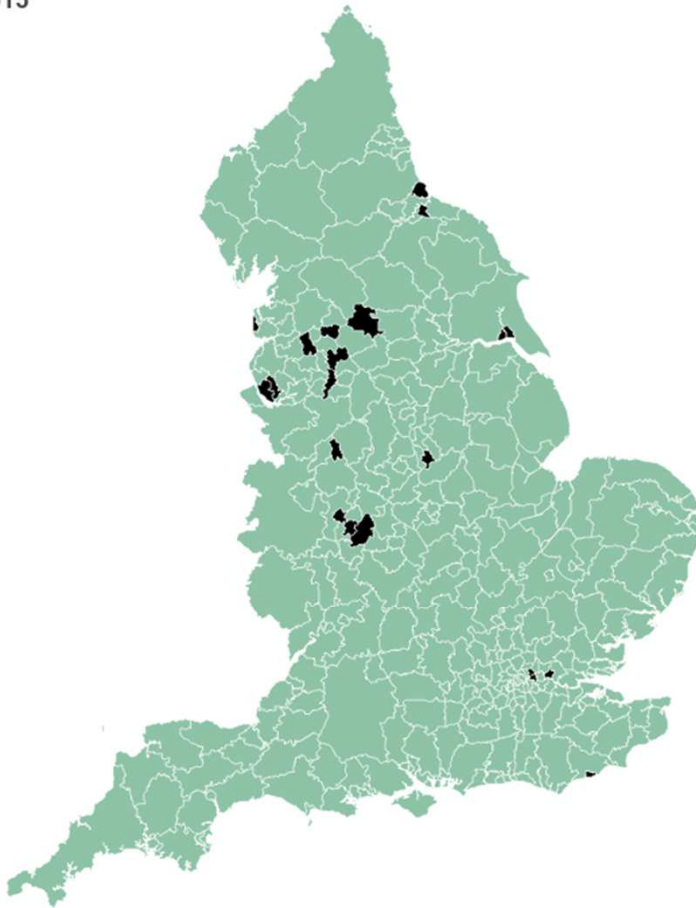

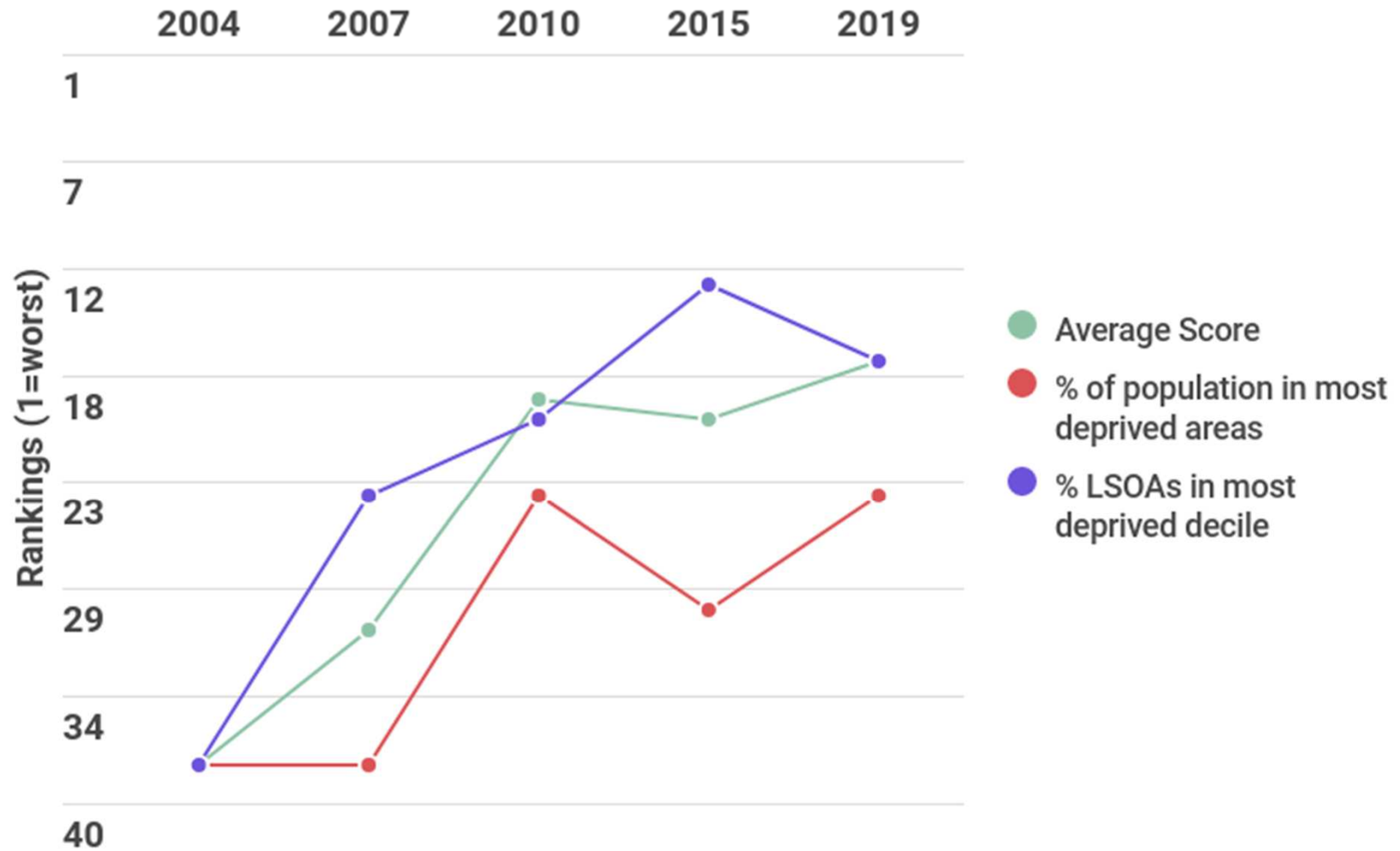

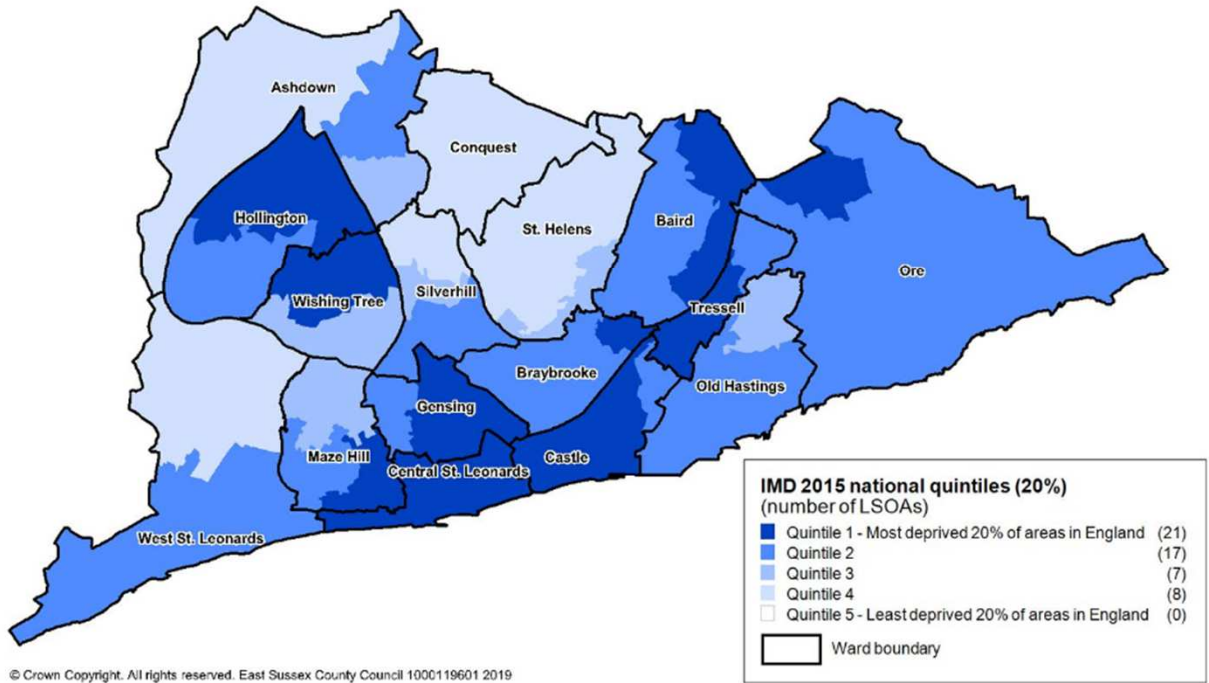

where 1 is the most deprived in England

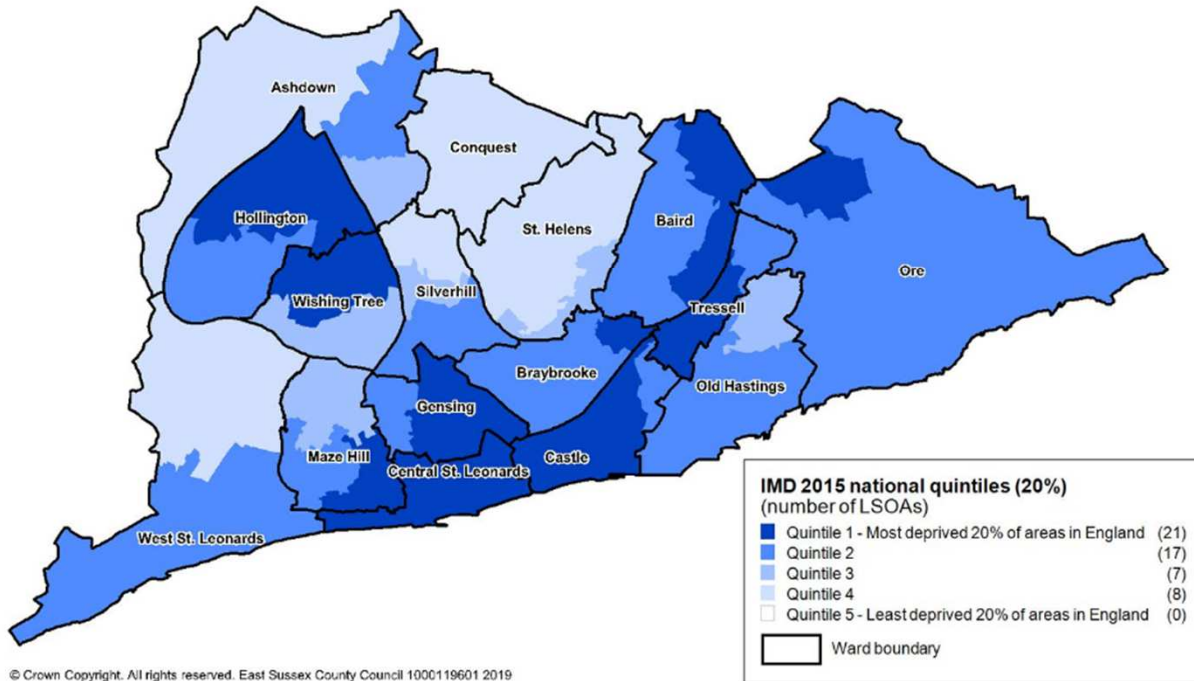

Areas of deprivation within Hastings

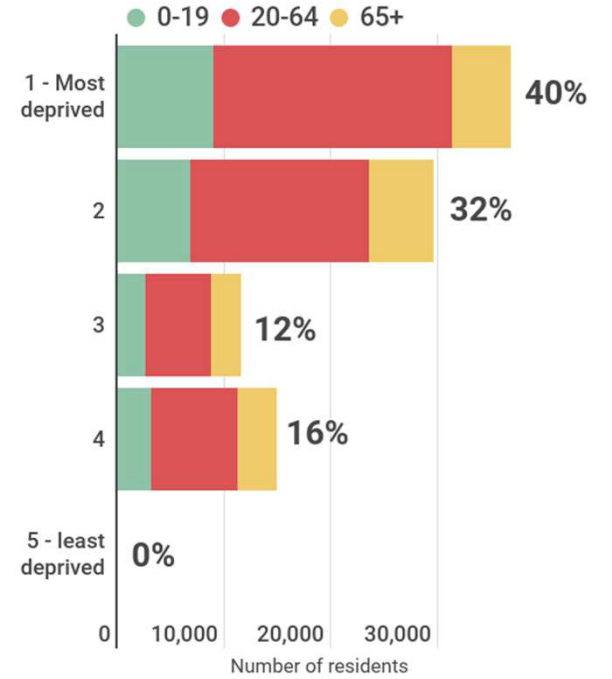


Areas of deprivation within Hastings

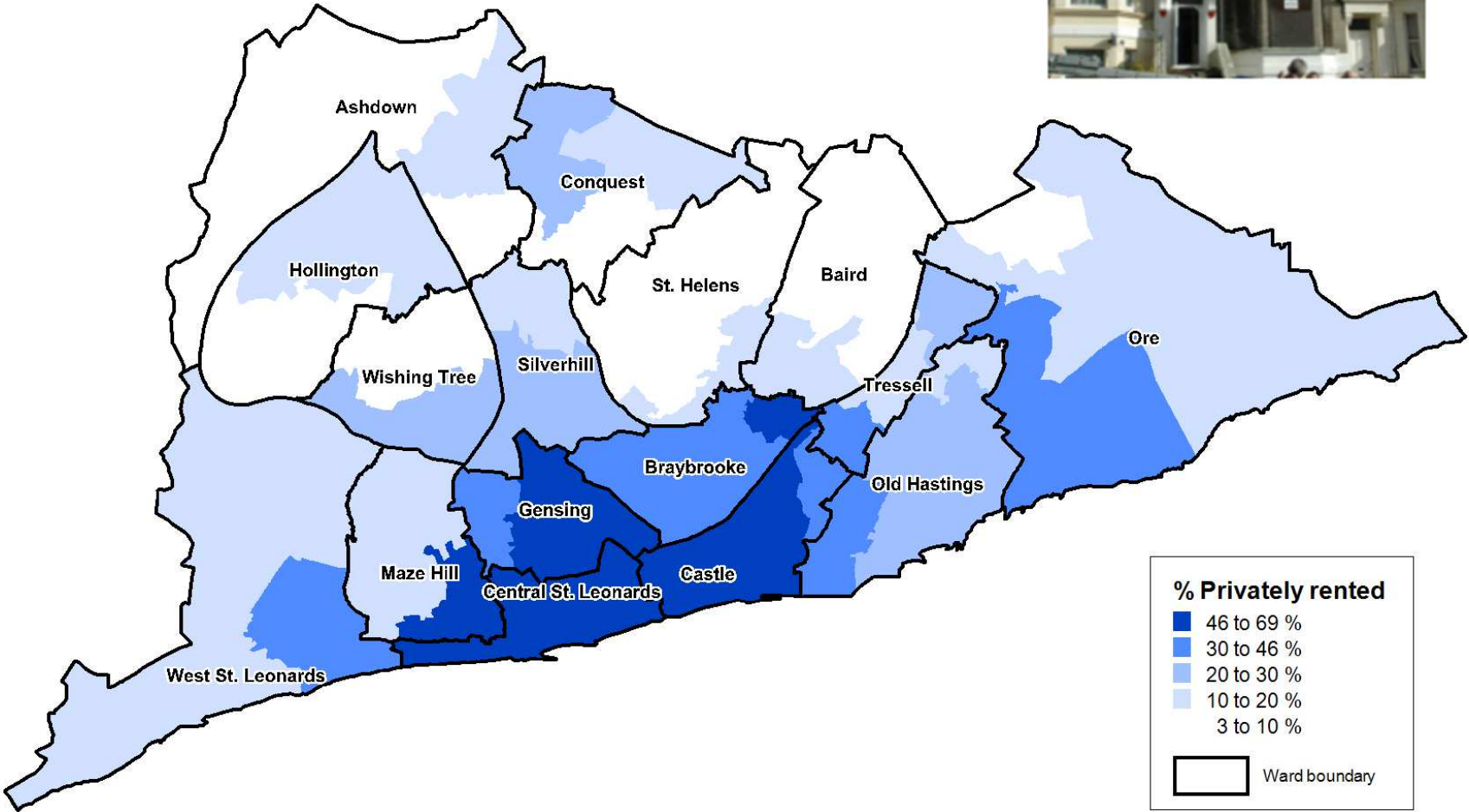
Population by deprivation quintile

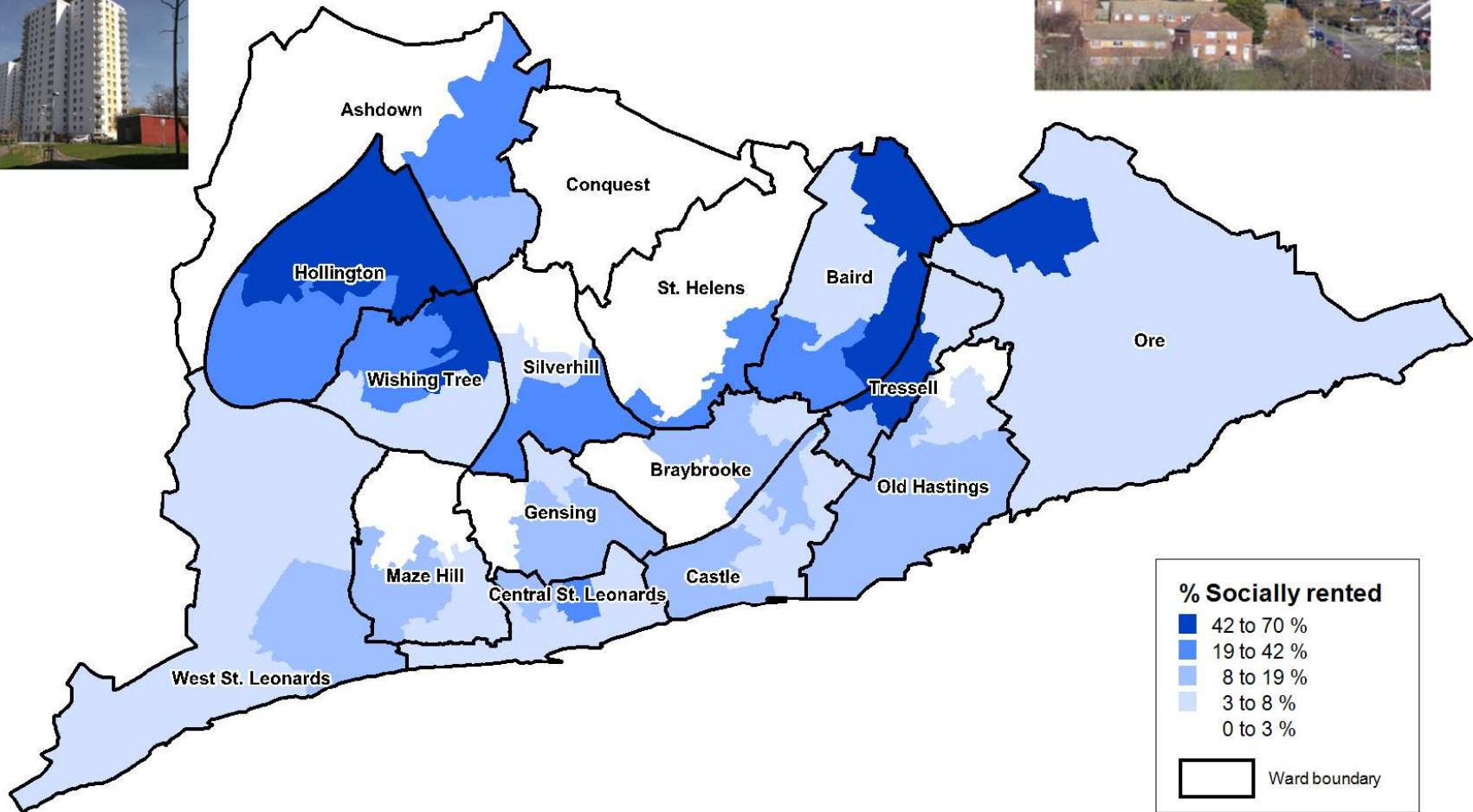


Housing within Hastings

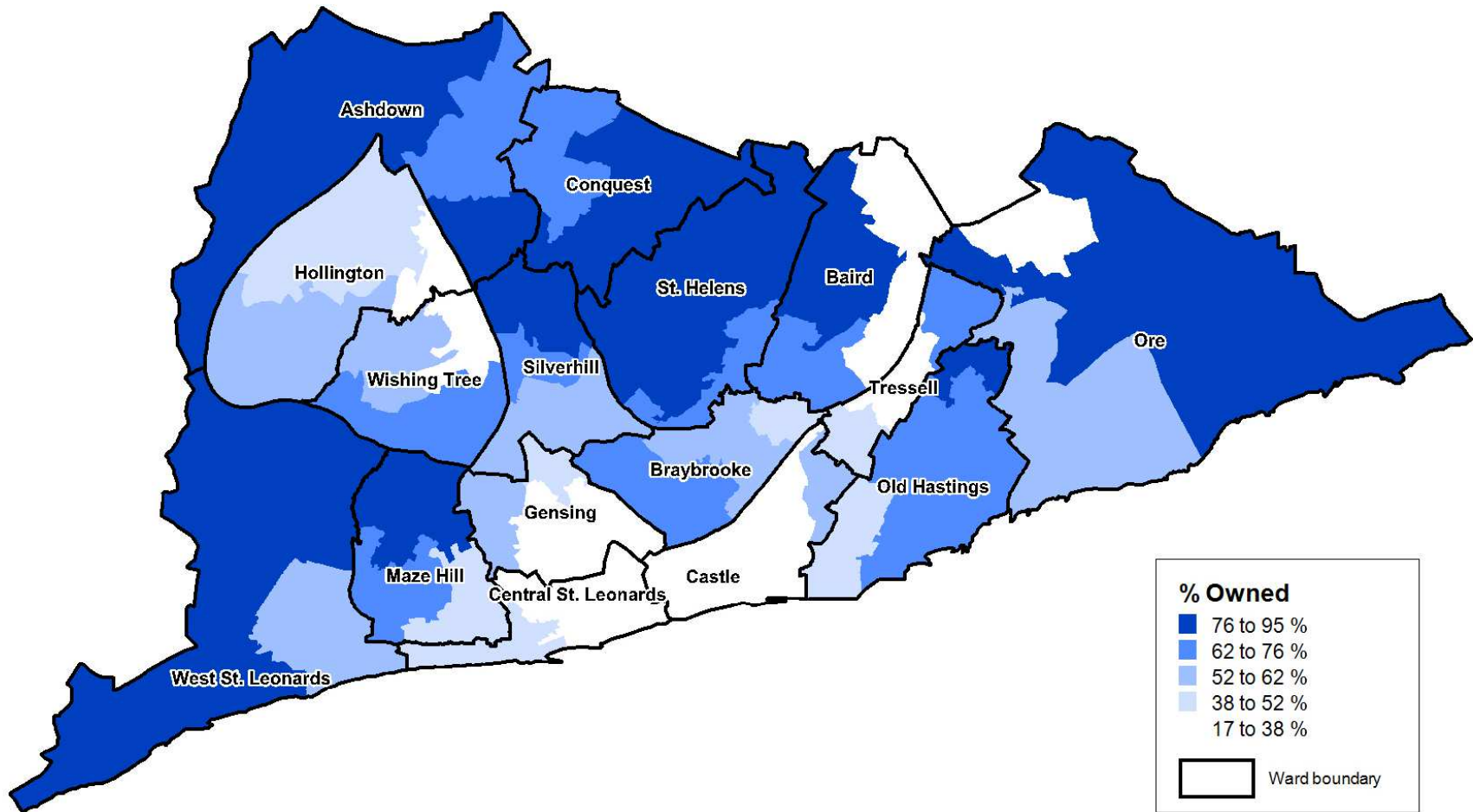

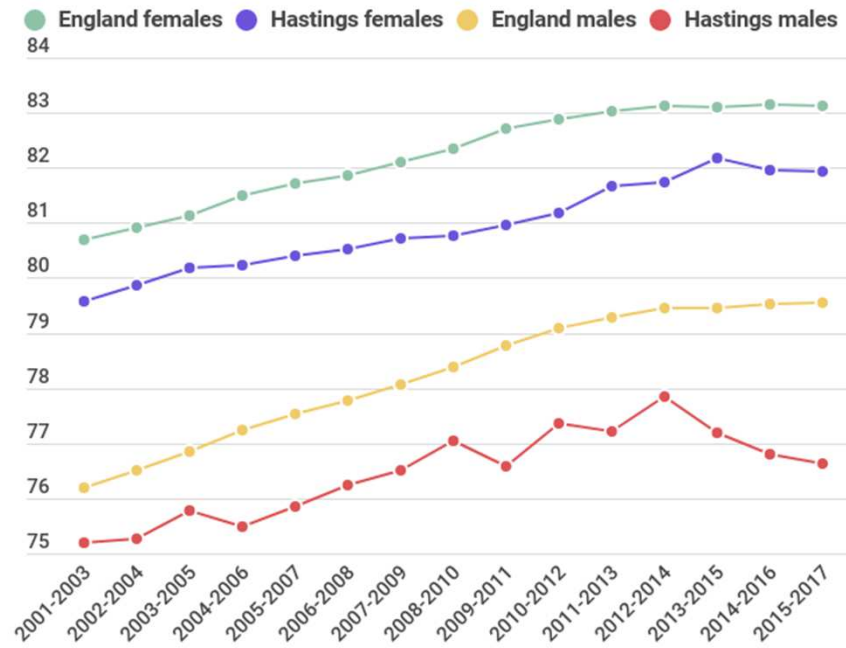

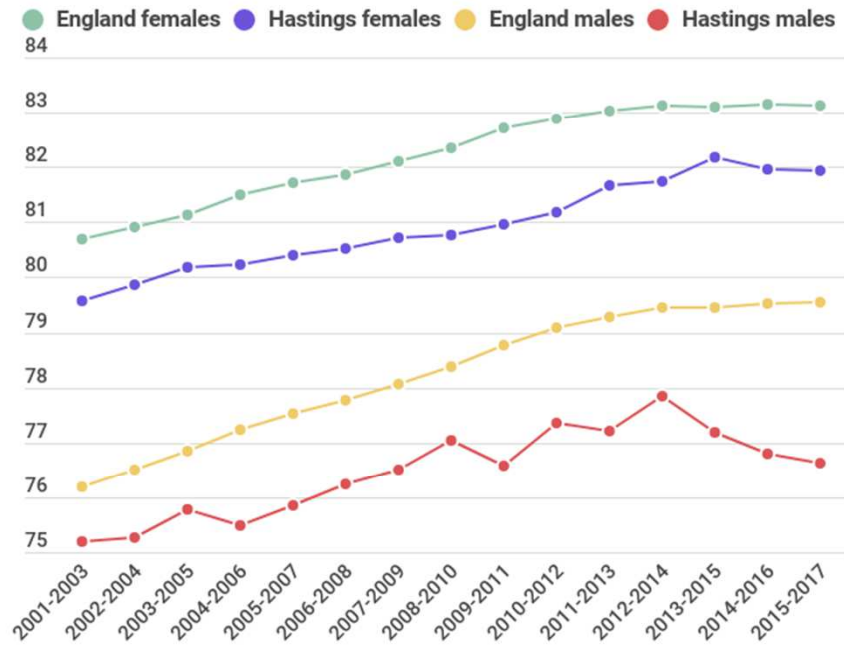

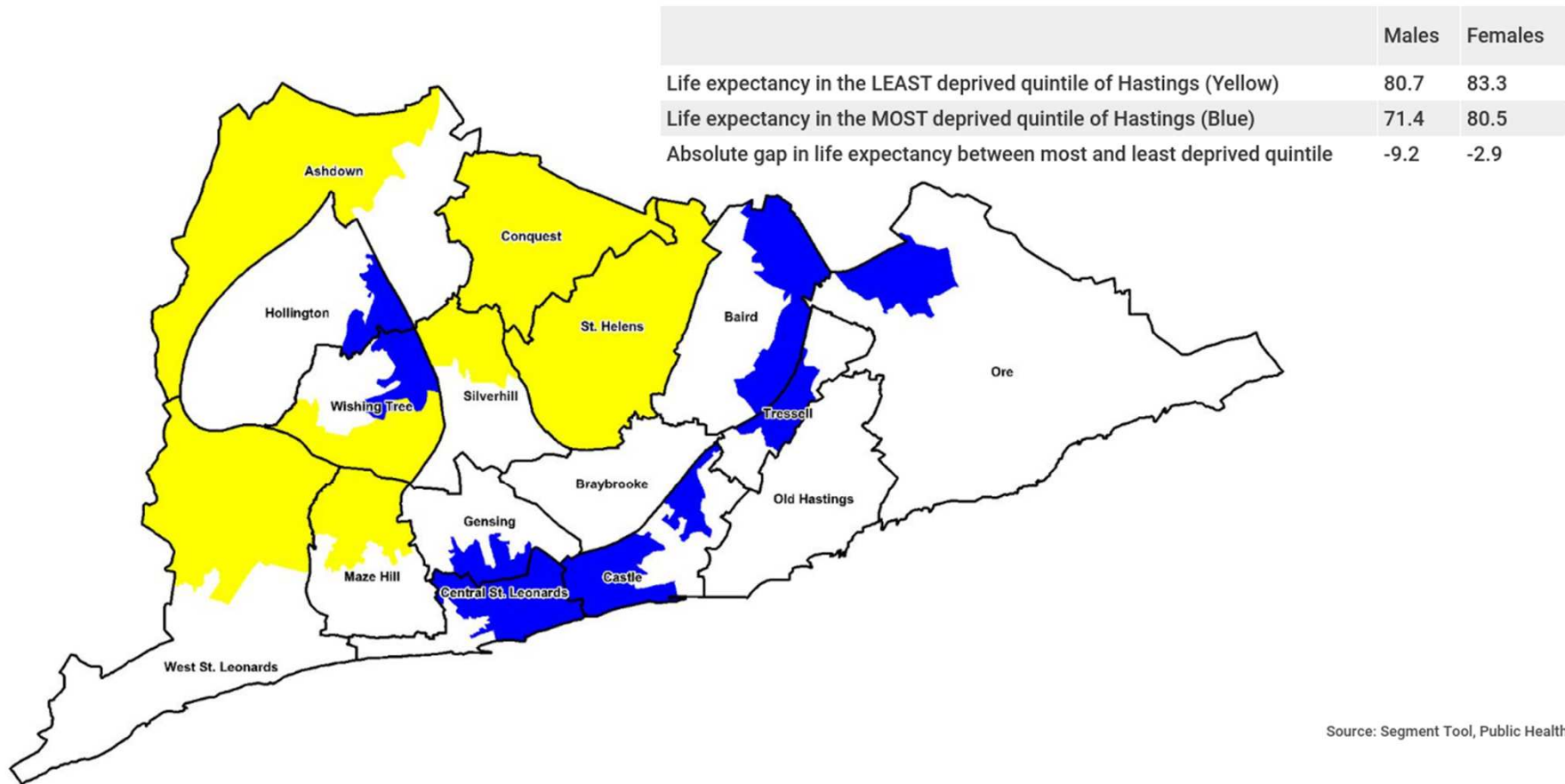

Hastings' ranking out of 324 areas

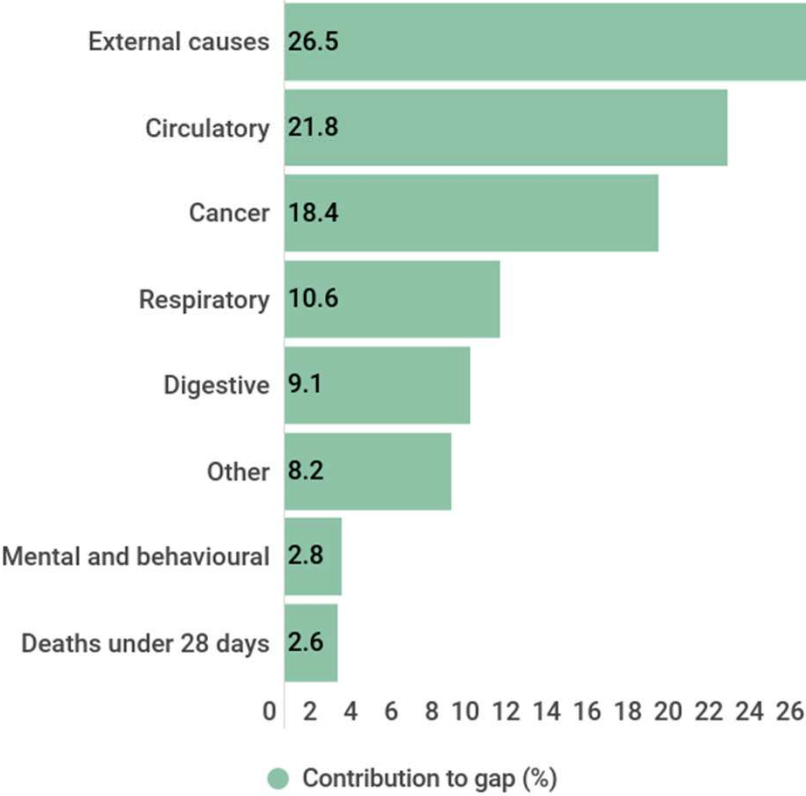


Life expectancy gap within Hastings in 2015-17

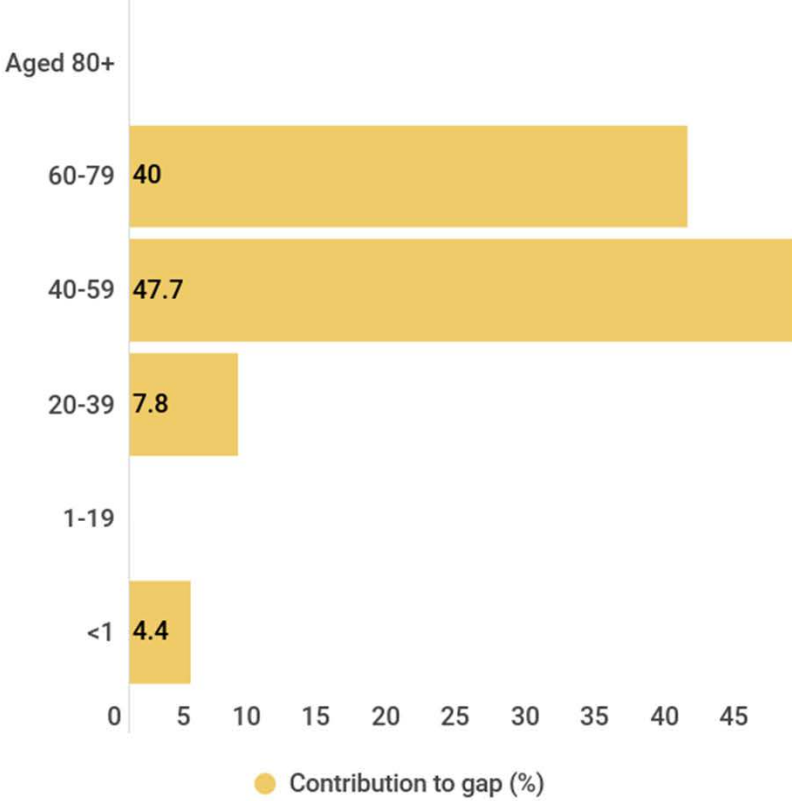
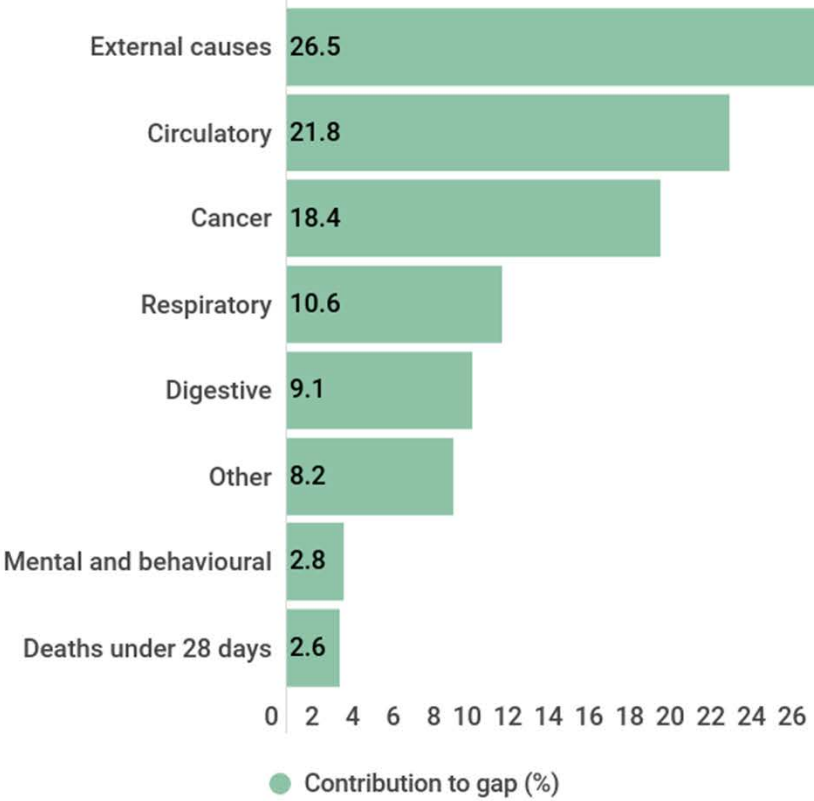

Contribution to the life expectancy gap for males



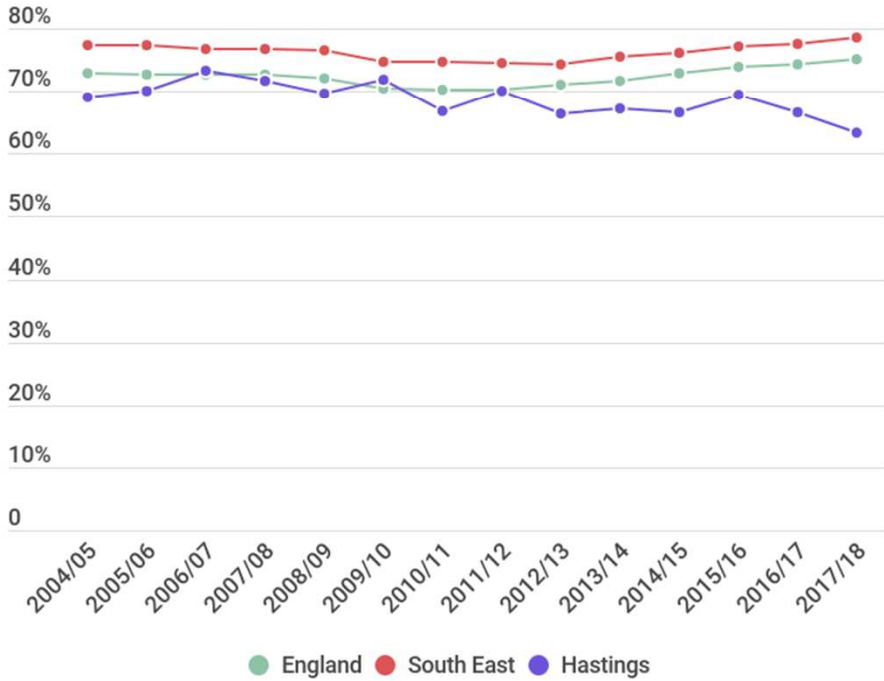
Contribution to the life expectancy gap for males

Employment in Hastings

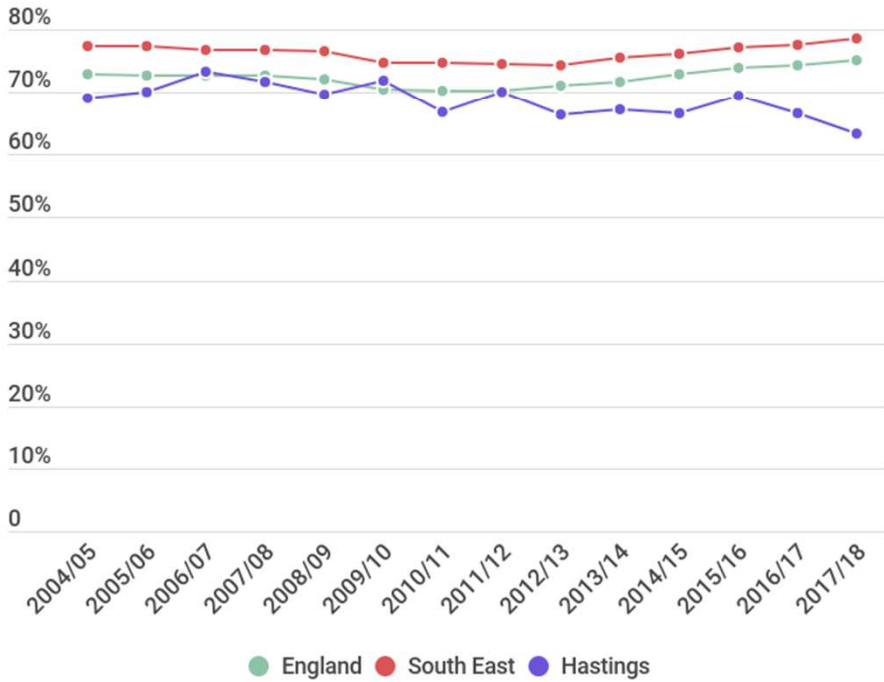
Working age population in employment

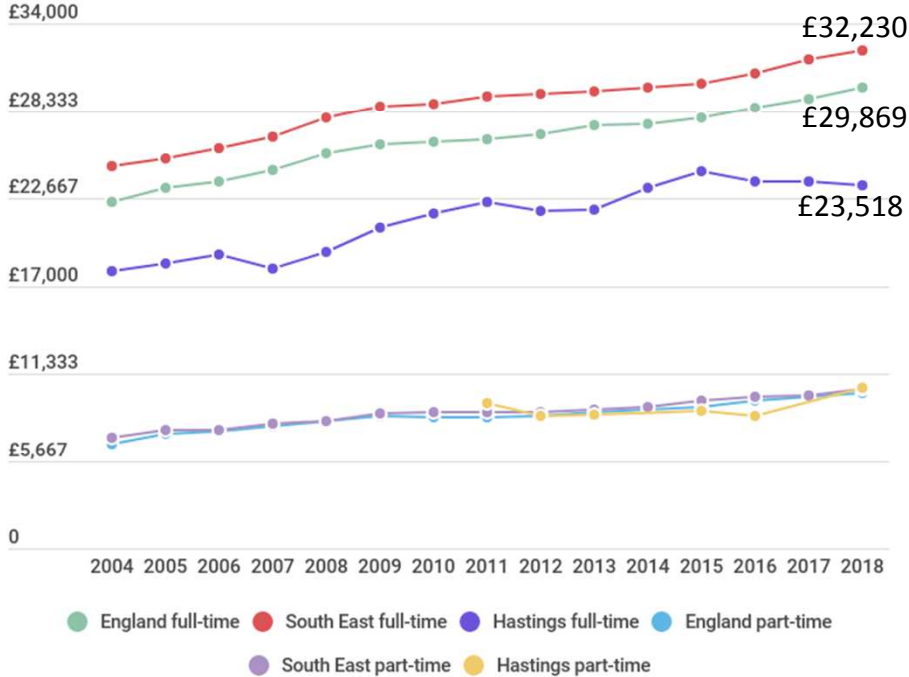
Employment in Hastings

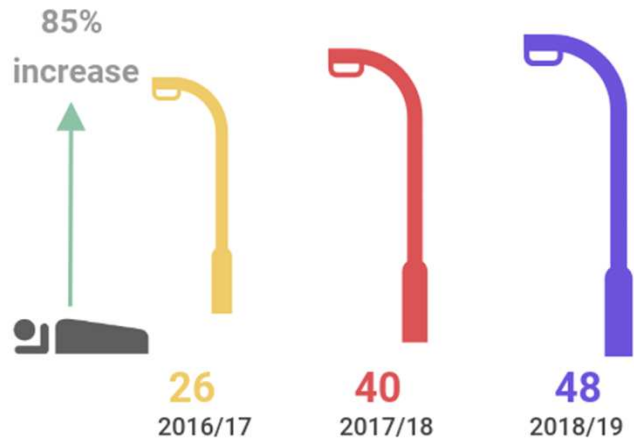
Average annual earnings (gross)

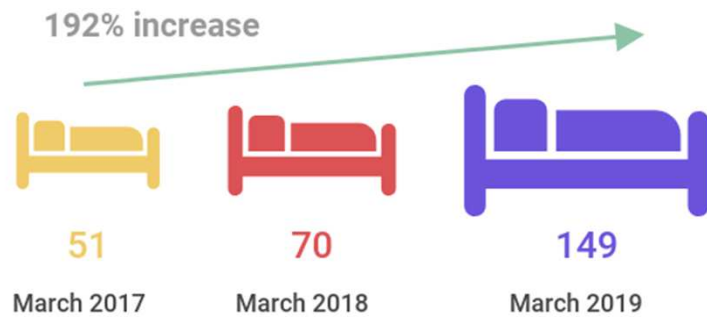

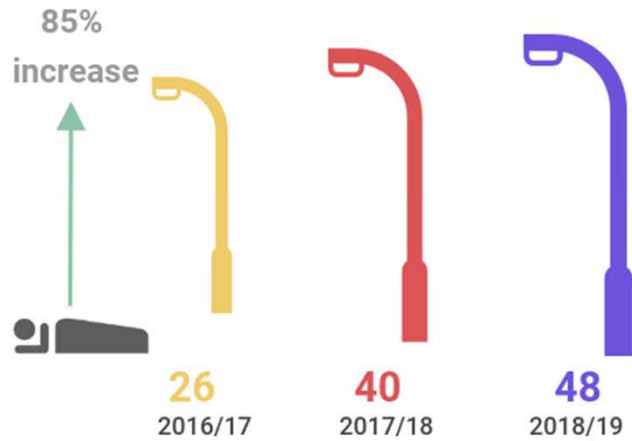
Individuals and families living in B&B



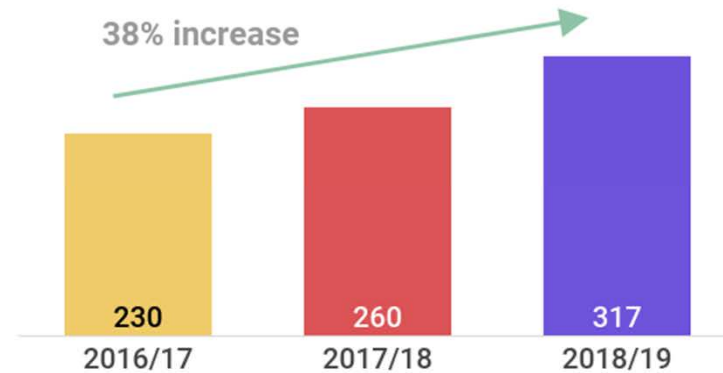

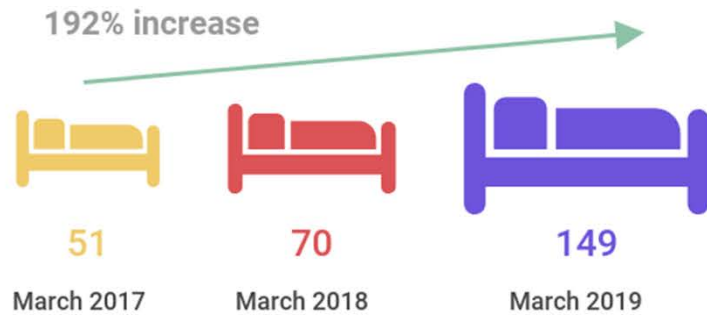

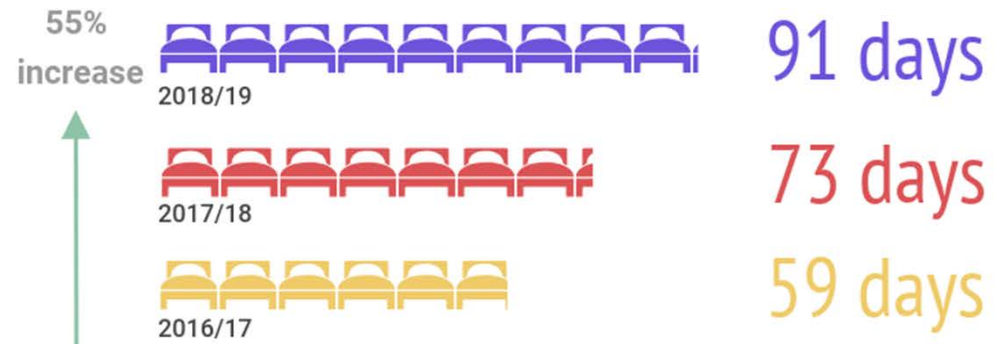

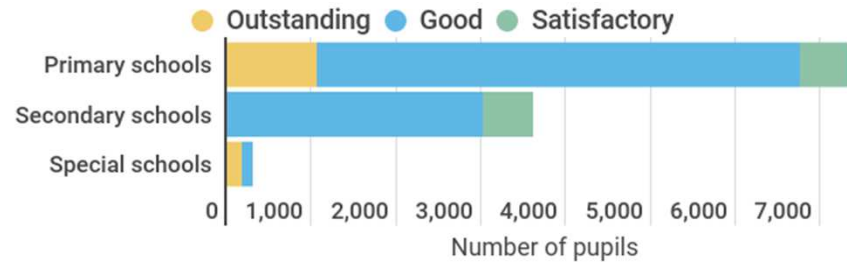

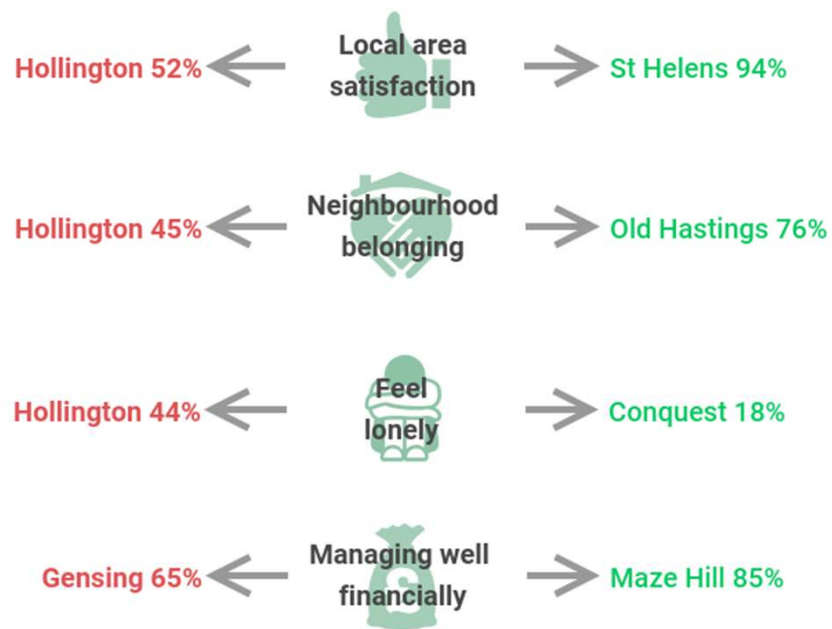

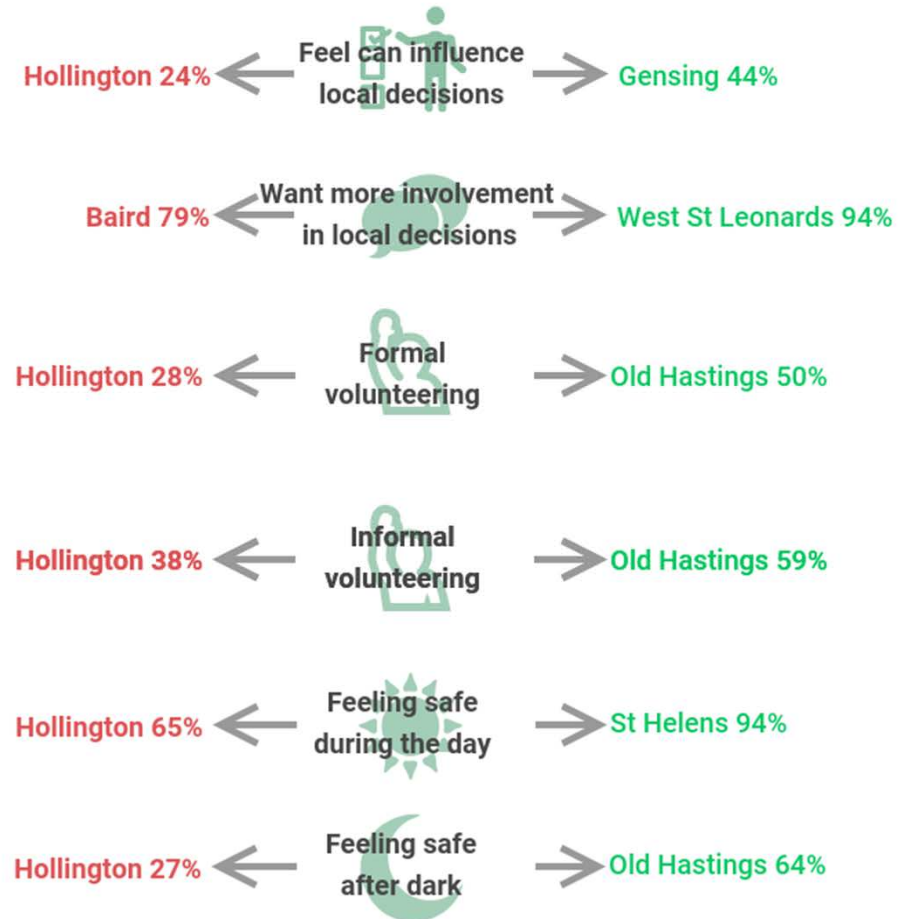

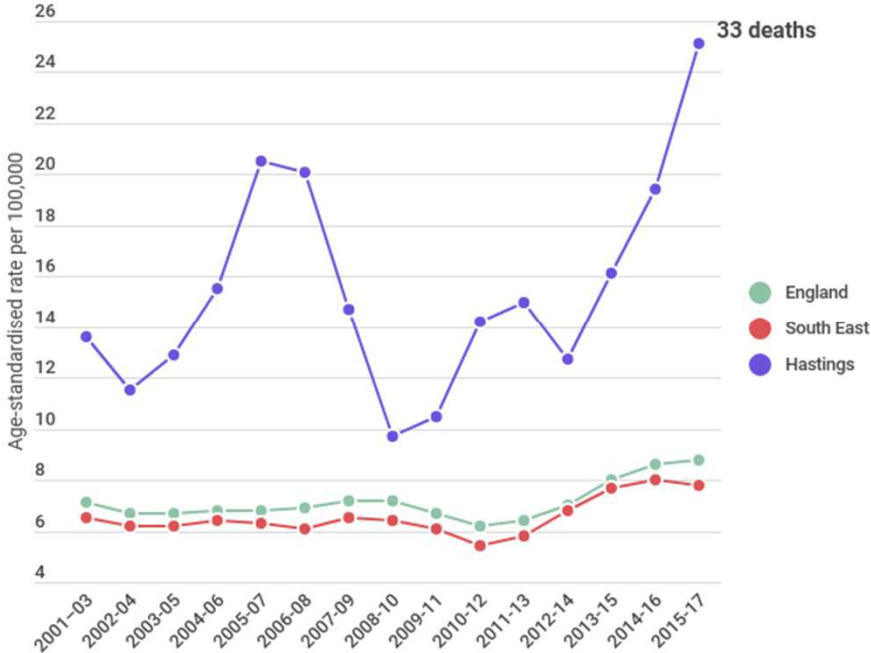

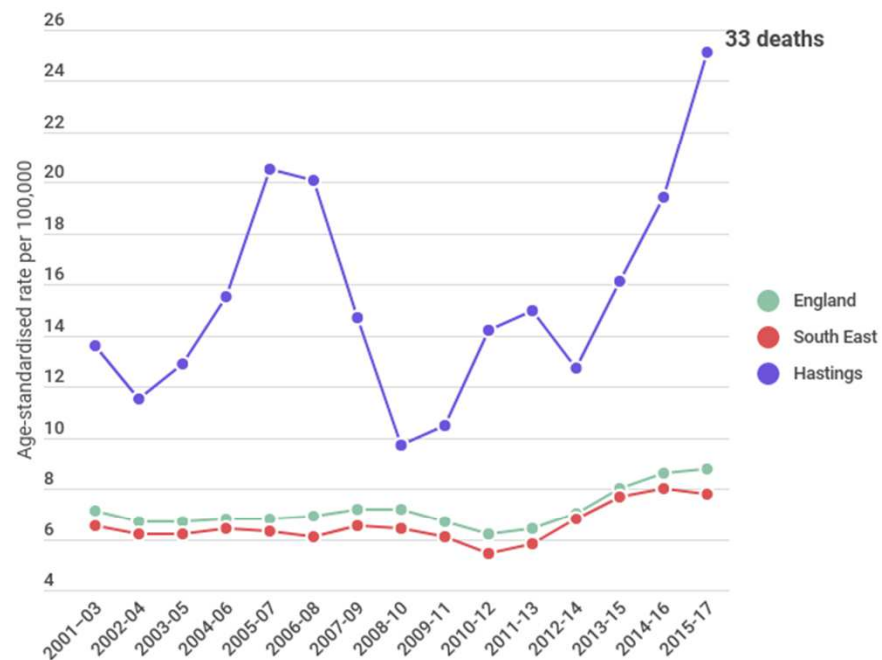

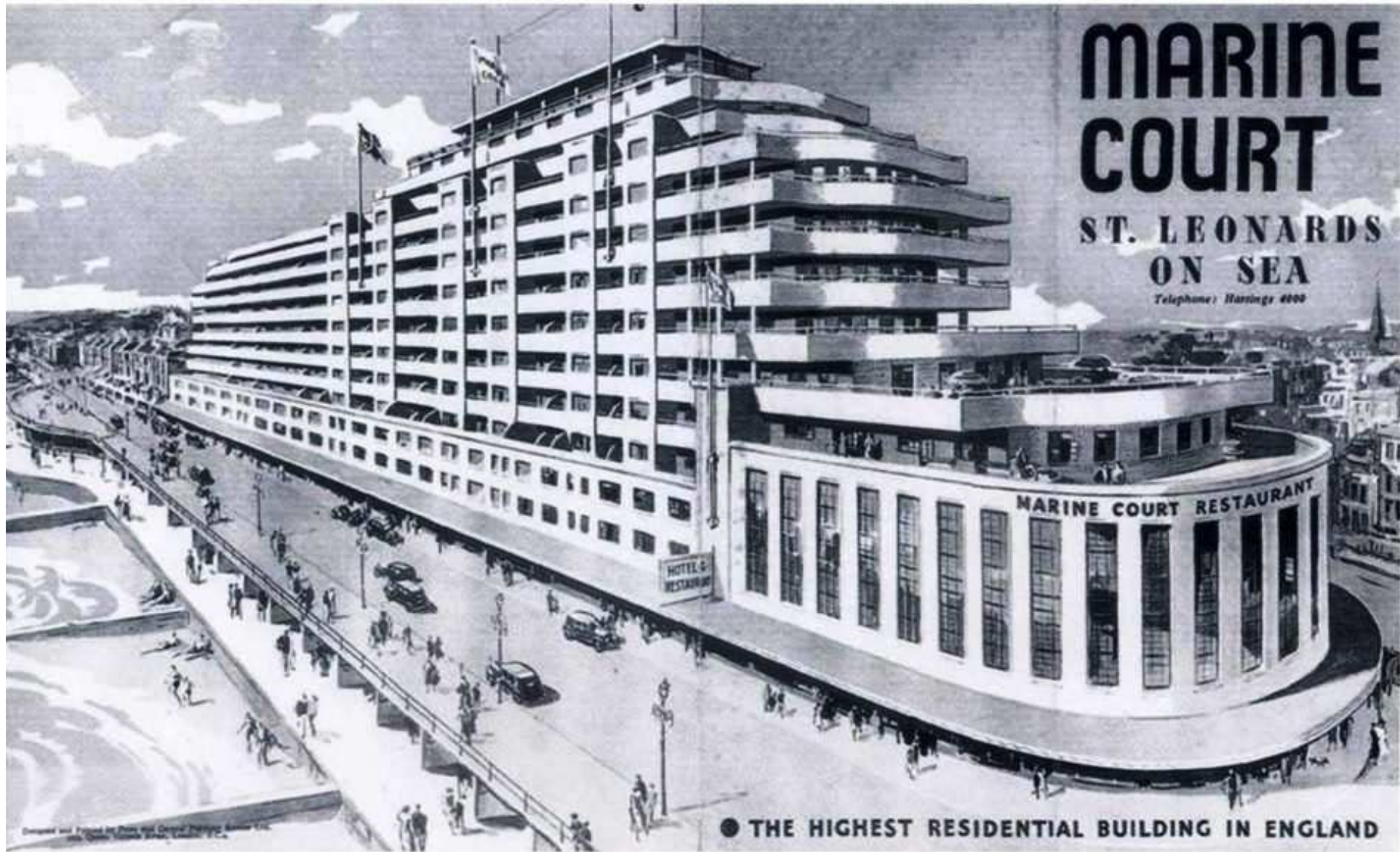
The Charter is a collaborative approach to promote good attendance at school across Hastings, so that all children and young people can fulfil their potential.

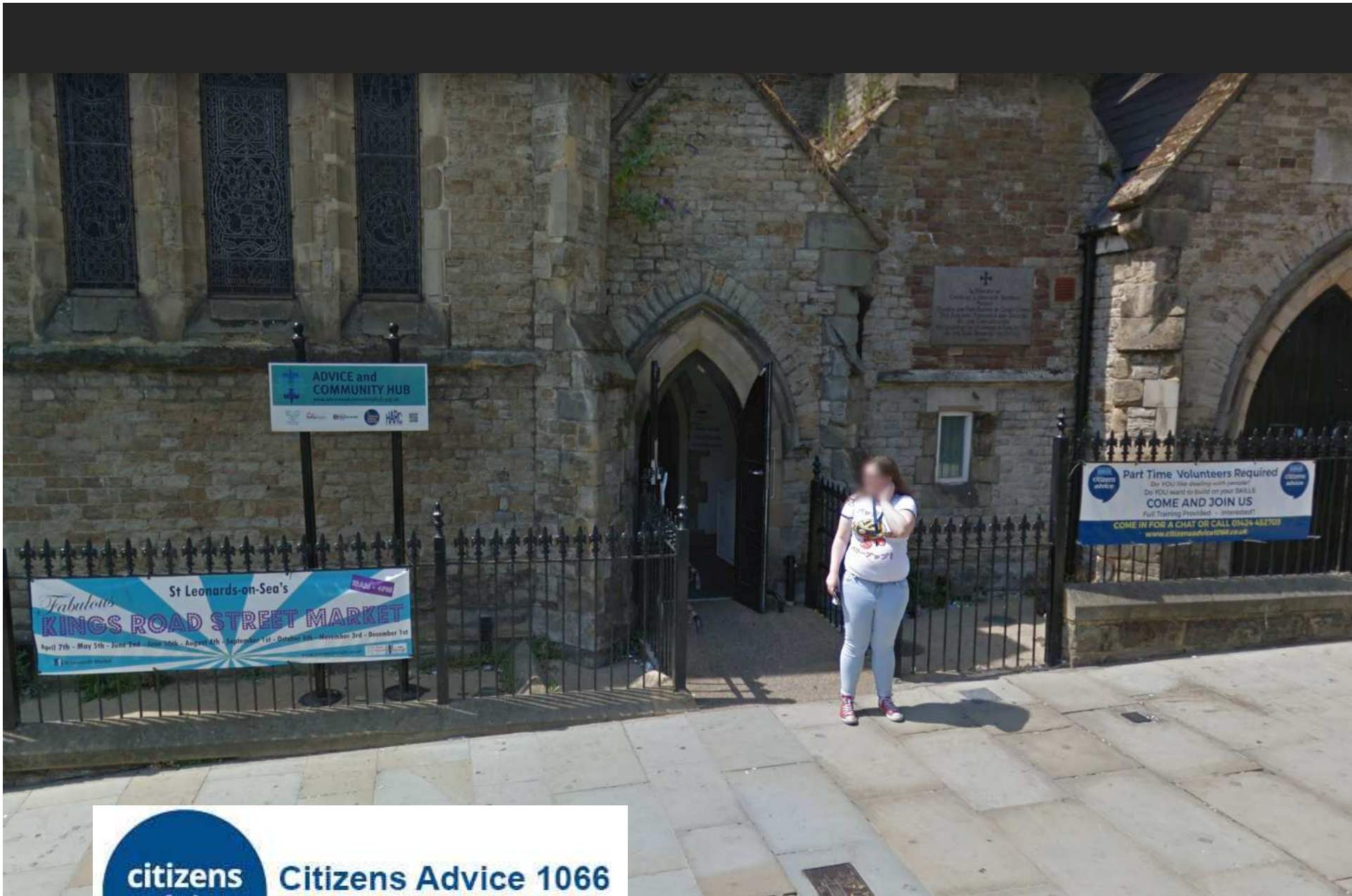

Context

Literature review

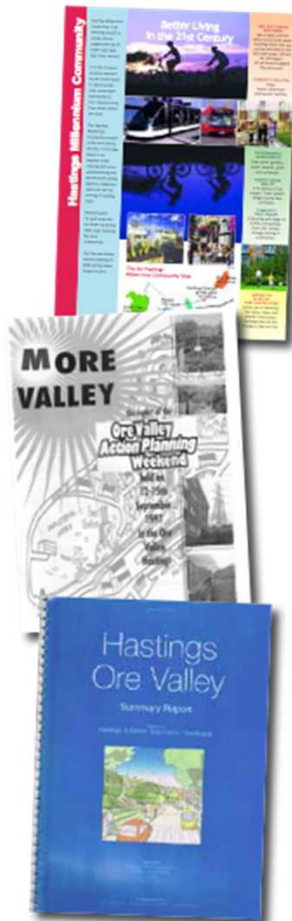
When the 'Getting Started' team were preparing their proposal for approaching the Big Local work, a number of informal conversations took place with residents and service providers who have a history of engagement and activism in the area we now identify as North East Hastings. These conversations identified a detailed and comprehensive body of past activity and generated an interest in building a history of consultation, engagement and planning activity which had taken place within the area.

This initial scoping work revealed the existence of a significant body of work ranging from local history articles, master-planning exercises, evaluations of past projects, neighbourhood plans, consultations and surveys. From this, and the richness of the material which had been found, the North East Hastings Literature Review began to take shape.

Essentially, a literature review recognises that any activity does not materialise "out of nowhere" but exists within a history, framework and context of previous work to which it should relate. It is also important that any new work takes account of what is already known and seeks to fill a gap or build on existing knowledge rather than simply repeats what has gone before.

In taking this approach the team were also acutely aware that as agencies and public services change and – in the present climate shrink – there is a real risk that the "corporate memory" of past work and research will diminish over time as individual practitioners leave or organisations re-structure. Therefore, the Literature Review is a way of preserving past work and making this available to a wider set of residents, agencies and academics who may use it to inform their current work or approach.

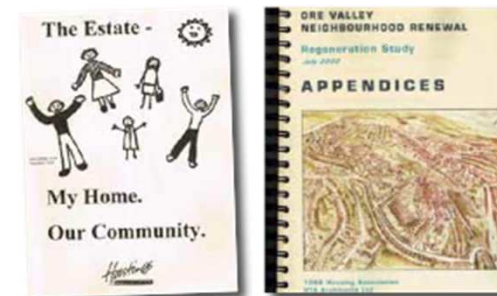
In practical terms the literature review has involved developing a spreadsheet cataloguing material of possible relevance and recording key bibliographic data as well as summarising any findings. A selection of the most important material is provided in the Literature Listing Appendix 3 and also on the Big Local 'Getting Started' website



(‘Before Big Local’ menu tab) with live access to individual source documents where these are available digitally.

The process of undertaking a literature review has provided a context which has been used to inform individual conversations with residents. An example of this is shown in the "timeline" exercise which was used extensively in the Big Local Roadshow events. As part of this approach a report from a community led-action planning exercise from 1997 was used. Many residents were unaware that the community had created a formal document describing its vision for the area and were asked simple questions arising from it e.g. "In 1997 residents identified young people as the top priority – is this still the case and how have things changed?". In this way the current Big Local work could be presented properly in the context of previous activity and in a way which enabled residents to examine change and development over periods of time.

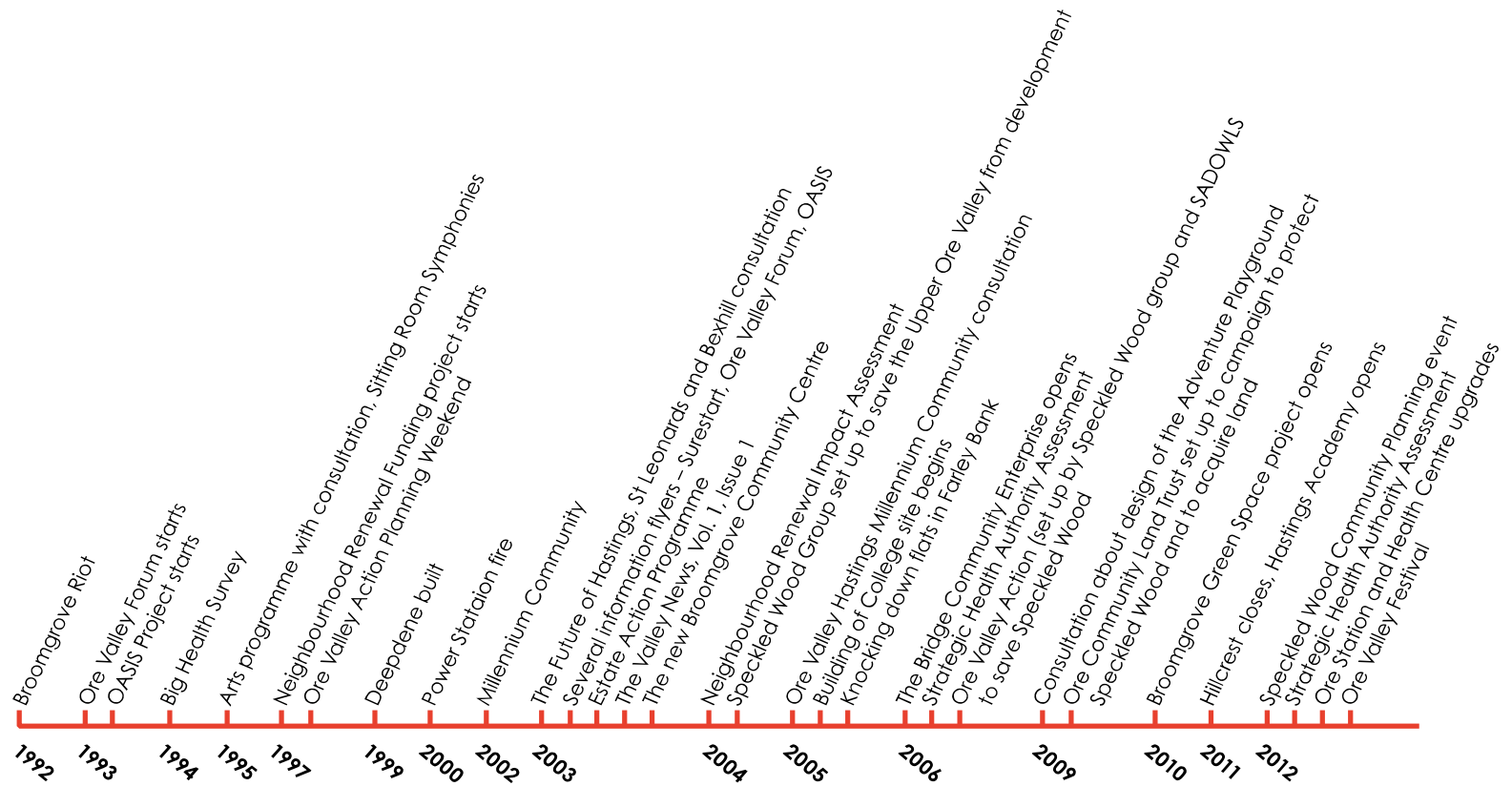
The 'Getting Started' Team are keen that the Literature Review which has been created should be a "living" document which grows over time adding to the intelligence about the area. Therefore, having created the framework, initial discussions have taken place with the University of Brighton with a view to embedding the North East Hastings material within the Hastings Knowledge Exchange, a new initiative from the Community University Partnership Programme which aims to bring together the knowledge of local communities, voluntary organisations, practitioners and university academics to share their different understandings and perspectives on issues of common interest.

North East Hastings Timeline – developed by local people at 'Getting Started' Big Local events

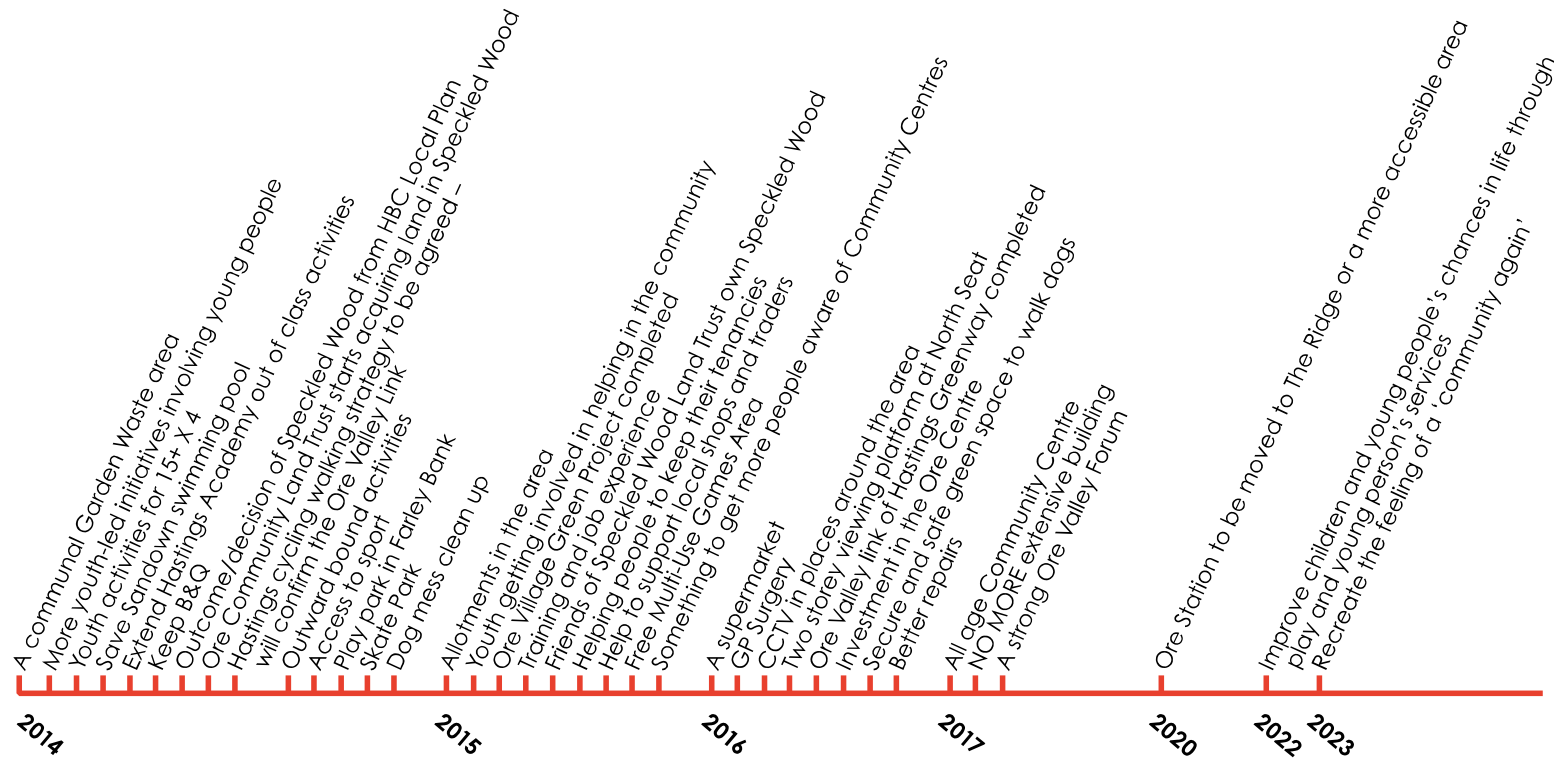

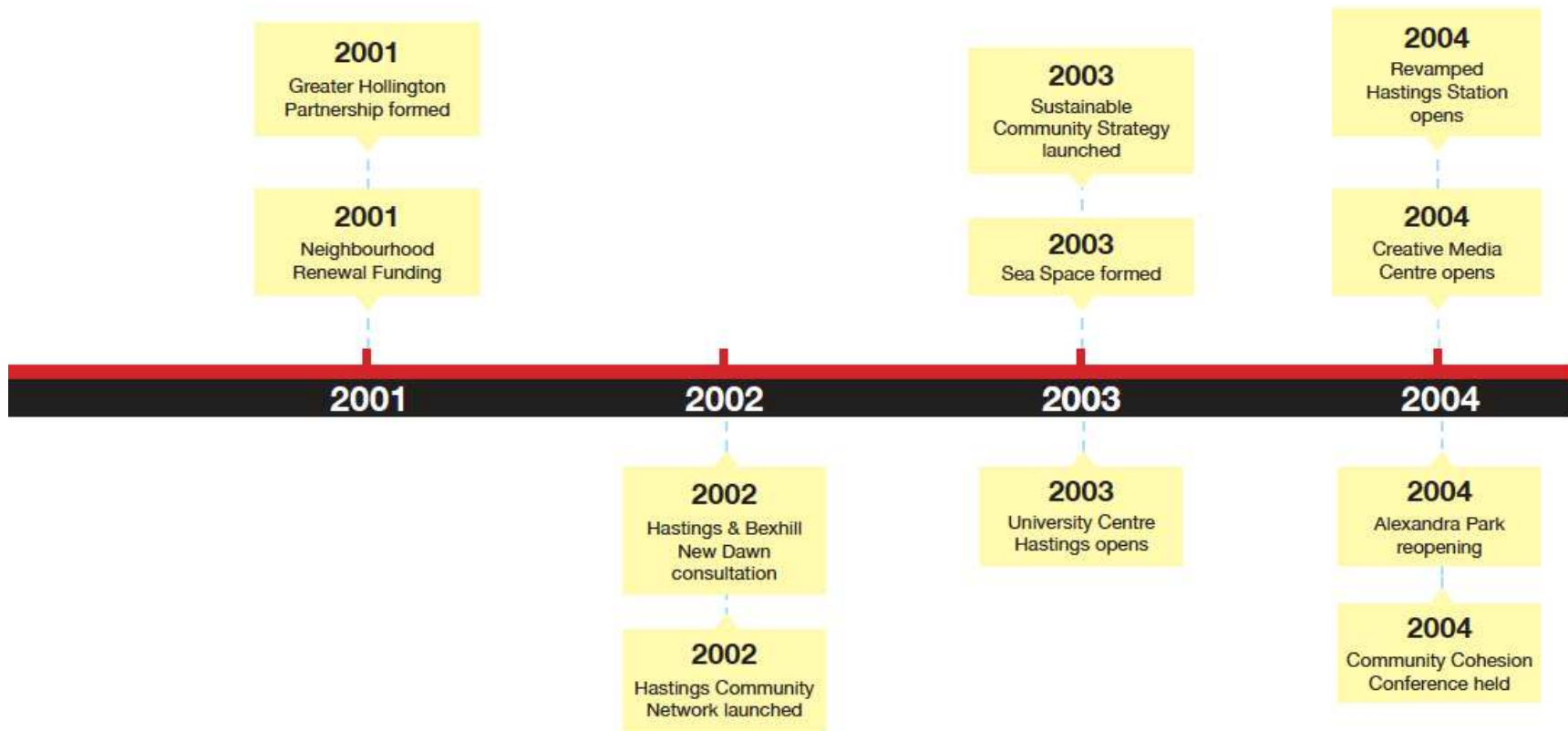

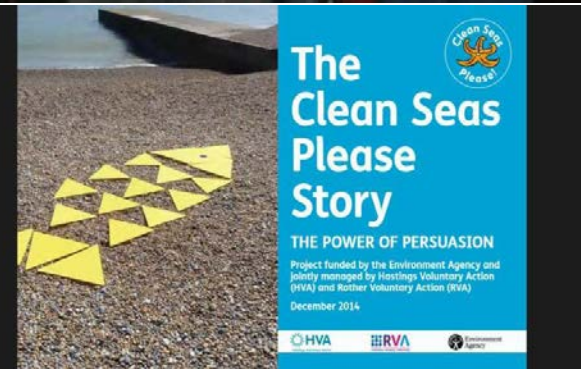

Summary of themes from the day

- There is an opportunity to work with academic institutions on research led initiatives and use evidence to inform what we do to address health inequalities
- Researchers and funders need to engage more fully with the local authority and voluntary and community sectors
- There is evidence of great innovation in Hastings which needs to be captured to make sure everyone is using this learning
- Seaside towns have significant and specific economic problems which need to be addressed
- Partners need to work with central government to promote the need for Hastings' rail infrastructure development

Professor Whitty's closing remarks

- Seaside towns would be looked at by the DHSC collectively, as they had many similarities;
- Research needed to be led by partnerships across Local Authorities and academic institutions; and
- The DHSC needs to look at how it engages with voluntary sector organisations collectively.
